In 1972, Janet knew she had no chance at the gold medal—she had been blown away by Austria's Trixie Schuba in the compulsory figures. She was saddened by her performance and argued with God, saying, "I wanted to do it for You, my nation, and my coach."

She remembers, "Then I thought, 'Perhaps there's a bigger purpose to my skating, to show God's love and express the gift for skating he gave me." With that attitude, she skated.

Then the unthinkable happened—Janet fell to the ice. The crowd grew very quiet.

Yet, "I was able to keep smiling," she recalls. And the crowd roared it's support for the grit, perseverance, and attitude of this American figure skater.

Janet's smile became an image, as one Tokyo hotel employee explained, that meant "there is hope, even in failure."

Winter is always a season which demands perseverance and grit. Perhaps now as much as ever.

In Epiphany, we remember the perseverance of the wise men, who traveled for many weeks through thick and thin led by God through the light of a bright star.

As we endure another trying winter, be encouraged by Lamentations 3: "The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

"The LORD is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in Him." The LORD is good to those who wait for Him, to the soul who seeks Him."

May the Lord help you to persevere through difficult moments, drawing hope from the love and faithfulness of Christ Jesus.

Tyler in Common: poised for a new moment

When a group of about 60 folks from all across Tyler gathered on the fourth floor of the Grelling Spence building about two and a half years ago to view and discuss a documentary film about the African slave trade and its connections to one Episcopalian family in the New England, I never could have imagined the future. I never could have imagined what lay ahead for this web of relationships that, with the support of the Episcopal Health Foundation, would become Tyler in Common.

Despite the interruptions—going on two years now—of a crippling pandemic, I never could have imagined that our little group would be awarded \$150,000 by the Episcopal Health Foundation to launch a community organizing effort in Tyler. Yet this is precisely the news I received last Fall, the results of months of networking, meeting, and vision casting.

But what *is* community organizing? Sometimes the best say to define or describe something is to say what it's *not*. I know of two things community organizing is not. It is not flash-in-the-pan activism that tends to die out after an initial burst of passion, the kind of thing we've seen repeatedly in the news and on the streets of American cities, in response to the murders of African American victims such as George Floyd. Our God calls us to work for justice, but if a movement is "here today and gone tomorrow," what, really, has changed? Sometimes the cynicism that results from such makeshift efforts leaves things even worse than before.

On the other end of the spectrum is an equal and opposite social phenomenon which clarifies what community organizing is *not*. Several years ago Christ Church hosted an event featuring the author of *When Helping Hurts*. The point of this book is that there is no magic salvation that occurs when people of means write checks to charitable nonprofit organizations. Now, funding is crucial for the success of vital organizations and institutions. And yet, sometimes when well-intended folks write a check, this serves only to keep the needy at arm's length. When you observe the life and ministry of Christ, or the lifestyle of the apostles in the Book of Acts, a different picture emerges: far from keeping folks at arm's length, the narrative shows us the power of relationship.

Speaking of relationships, near the heart of community organizing is importance of listening. What are the pressing needs which actually afflict the families and neighborhoods of North Tyler? It's easy for a white leaders such as myself to make assumptions, or to project my own biases. Yet the inner dynamic of community organizing is bringing folks together from both sides of the divide—you might say "from North Tyler and from South Tyler"—and fostering an ethos of *listening*.

Many times of the last two and a half years I've sat at a table or in a room with several black colleagues, who throw up there hands and say, "Too much empty talk and impotent words! I've had enough *talking*. It's time for *action*. We need to *do something*!" There is real energy behind those words ... and yet what I've learned from gifted organizers over the years is that when we *act*, we need our action to be successful. It's so easy, again, to fizzle out with no long term result. But for our actions to be successful, they must be well chosen and wisely executed.

And for *that*, guess what is needed? Listening. Folks from both sides must communicate clearly. White folks from South Tyler must listen deeply and openly to what North Tylerites are saying (and vice-versa). This is why I often say, "In Tyler in Common, we don't gather just to *talk*; we gather just to *listen*."

Does community organizing sound interesting to you? If so, keep Tyler in Common in your prayers, and let me (Father Matt) know that you are interested. By the grace of God, Tyler in Common is well-poised for this moment, when we anticipate the end of the pandemic (please, God!).
