From the Rector:

Jesus said, "A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell along the path, and the birds came and devoured them. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and immediately they sprang up, since they had no depth of soil, but when the sun rose they were scorched. And since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and produced grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty." Matthew 13.4-8

While we are individuals, our identity is strongly shaped by people and events beyond ourselves. People who grew up in fourteenth century Europe were formed by the Black Death. A person like my greatgrandfather who grew up 120 ago in a German-speaking family in Luckenbach, Texas experienced a different world than a child growing up in Ukraine in 2022.

In the parable of the sower, Jesus reminds us that an essential work of the Christian and the Church is to tend the soil. As the quality of the earth in which a seed is planted is consequential, the health and resources of the Church are vital to the development of strong Christian faith.

For well over a century, Christ Church has been well served by those who tended our soil. Hundreds of clergy and lay leaders have faithfully tended our spiritual soil for generations.

Now it is our turn.

The theme for 2023 Stewardship—God's Generosity: Our Response reminds us that the Lord has abundantly blessed us with the resources to enjoy an amazing life. We demonstrate our response by sharing and investing our time, talent, and treasure in the ministry of Christ Church in the coming year. St. Francis

October 4 is the Feast Day of St. Francis, however, we celebrated his Day on Sunday, October 2 with a Blessing of the Pets in Bergfeld Park. In my opinion, St. Francis is our most popular saint. If the government census included the concrete statues of St. Francis found in peoples' yards in this country, with the bird sitting atop his shoulder, and the squirrel at his feet, it would probably double our population. There are many stories about the life of St. Francis. Let me share one of them with you.

Perhaps the most famous story of St. Francis is when he tamed the wolf that was terrorizing the people of Gubbio. While Francis was staying in that town he learned of a wolf so ravenous that it was not

only killing and eating animals, but people, as well. The people took up arms and went after it, but those who encountered the wolf perished at its sharp teeth. Villagers became afraid to leave the city walls.

Francis had pity on the people and decided to go out and meet the wolf. Francis and his companions approached the wolf. Suddenly the wolf, teeth bared, charged out of the woods at them. Francis made the Sign of the Cross toward it. The power of God caused the wolf to slow down and to close its mouth.

Then Francis called out to the creature: "Come to me, Brother Wolf. In the name of Christ, I order you not to hurt anyone." At that moment the wolf lowered its head and lay down at St. Francis' feet, meek as a lamb.

St. Francis explained to the wolf that he had been terrorizing the people, killing not only

animals, but humans who are made in the image of God. "Brother Wolf," said Francis, "I want to make peace between you and the people of Gubbio. They will harm you no more and you must no longer harm them. All past crimes are to be forgiven."

The wolf showed its assent by moving its body and nodding its head.


Then to the absolute surprise of the gathering crowd, Francis asked the wolf to make a pledge. As St. Francis extended his hand to receive the pledge, so the wolf extended its front paw and placed it into the saint's

hand. Then Francis commanded the wolf to follow him into town to make a peace pact with the townspeople. The wolf meekly followed St. Francis.

By the time they got to the town square, everyone was there to witness the miracle. With the wolf at his side, Francis gave the town a sermon on the wondrous and fearful love of God, calling them to repent from all their sins. Then he offered the townspeople peace, on behalf of the wolf. The townspeople promised in a loud voice to feed the wolf. Then Francis asked the wolf if he would live in peace under those terms. He bowed his head and twisted his body in a way that convinced everyone he accepted the pact. Then once again the wolf placed its paw in Francis' hand as a sign of the pact.

From that day on the people kept the pact they had made. The wolf lived for two years among the townspeople, going from door to door for food. It hurt no one and no one hurt it. Even the dogs did


not bark at it. When the wolf finally died of old age, the people of Gubbio were sad. The wolf's peaceful ways had been a living reminder to them of the wonders, patience, virtues and holiness of St. Francis. It had been a living symbol of the power and providence of the living God.



I don't know if there is even a grain of truth in this story, but nevertheless, St. Francis had a huge influence on Christianity and also on the shape of Western culture. The popular image of St. Francis preaching to the birds, blessing wolves, and rambling through nature like a 13th century hippie contains some truth, but maybe only a partial truth, because even though Francis loved nature, Jesus Christ was the cornerstone of St. Francis' ministry. After giving up a life of privilege, St. Francis dedicated himself to a life of living the Gospel, imitating the life of Jesus.

Several years ago, Ann and I were in Italy and saw a life-size statue of St. Francis in Assisi. Francis was not physically imposing, just over four feet in height and actually not much taller than one of the garden statues. He was apparently very charismatic, attracting people in droves to his ministry wherever he went. But it was not because of his appearance. The focus of St. Francis ministry was Jesus Christ, and his missionary strategy was to preach the Gospel everywhere and to all who had not heard of Christ. St. Francis believed that people are more influenced by what we do rather than what we say. He wanted his followers to be missionaries of peace and goodness, living lives of simplicity that imitated Christ, and sometimes he told his brothers before entering a town, "Preach the Gospel, and if necessary use words." St. Francis took a vow of poverty, chastity, and obedience, living the life of the Christ of the Gospels as closely and literally as he could. The childlike simplicity of his life serves as an example for us all.






