From the Rector:

Years ago, folks in the Rockies endured a hard winter. The snow piled deeper and deeper. The temperature dropped below zero and stayed there for weeks. People were suffering. So the Red Cross used helicopters to fly supplies in to help people who lived in the mountains.

Near the end of another hard day, the rescue team spied a cabin nearly covered in snow. A thin wisp of smoke arose from the chimney.

The rescuers figured that the cabin's residents were critically short of food, fuel and medicine. The thick trees

meant they had to land the helicopter a mile from the cabin. They placed the heavy supplies on their backs and trudged through the waist deep snow, reaching the cabin cold and exhausted. They pounded on the door until a thin older woman opened it up.


The leader said, "We're from the Red Cross ma'am."

She was silent for a moment. Then she replied, "It's been a long, hard, winter son. I just don't think we can give anything this year."

Forty days of fasting and self denial. A wilderness season in which we recall the years the Israelites spent in the wilderness and the days Jesus endured in the desert.

In the course of the day, my whole week went topsy turvy.


This same morning, one of the lections for morning prayer was from Matthew 6. The first bit reads:

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by worrying can add a single hour to your span of life?

And this it goes on:

Therefore do not worry, saying, What will we eat?' or What will we drink?' or What will we wear?' For it is the gentiles who seek all these things, and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.

That night I spent the night in sleeping bags piled in a heap in our living room by the fire while tree branches




coming day and week. This reading came as a timely reminder that God provides, that he knows what we need, and that worrying isn't all too helpful. Today's trouble is enough for today and by God's grace we'll make it through until the end of today. And if not, well, I suppose that's a goodly thing too. God gives and God takes away.

I am thinking about all of this especially as we head into the season of Lent. Lent is a time for penitence, for fasting, for reoriented our life toward Christ. It's a time where we choose for life to get a little leaner. Not because we love feeling sad or enjoy going without God's gift to us. No, rather, we fast for other reasons, not least because Jesus expects us to. But we also fast because we need to be reminded that God is so much greater than his gifts, and as much joy as steak or wine or coffee might bring to us, the thing we find lovely in each of these things is the God who provides them for us.

We are going to party on Mardi Gras. And we'll feast once more with glad hearts, thankful for what God has given. But then we'll head into the desert of Lent, learning to say no to our guts once in a while in order to be more attentive to the leading of the Spirit.

The two major fast days of Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. I'd encourage to skip a meal these days, if you are able. Take the time you'd spend eating to pray. If you are too hungry, have a small snack, called a collation. Worship with us at one of our services. Be reminded that you are mortal, that you have limits, that you are dust. And then for the rest of Lent (which does not include Sundays - it is impossible to fast on days we celebrate Christ's resurrection) say no to a good gift from God so that you might stoke your desire for him.

WHAT IS A RULE OF LIFE?

A rule of life is a bit like a healthy living plan for the spiritual life. Just like we make plans for wellness by thinking about how we will eat, exercise, and practice mindfulness, so we can craft a tailored rule of life for our spiritual fitness.

For a Christian, a rule of life should develop and grow out of the Gospel and the faith and order of Christ's Holy Catholic Church. It will include practices that we share in common as Christians, but it can also include practices that nourish us individually. The neat thing about a rule of life is that we can shape it to fit with our current life stage and situation. A rule of life for parents with young children will look different from one for single students, or a retired couple.

A rule of life is never an end in itself, but a means of ordering one's life toward Christ. If kept for it's own sake, the a rule of life is just another installation of the Law, rather than solid but flexible scaffolding for a journey toward Jesus and his call for us.

Each week we'll look at a different aspect of rule of life, with the intent that folks would craft their own personal rule of life over the course of the Lenten series. These will include reflections from the clergy of Christ Church on:

public worship . private devotions public witness . social action stewardship
