# from the associate rector...

# The Rev. Dr. Cole Hartin,

This past week I read a wonderful article in *The New Yorker* titled, "<u>Taco Bell's Innovation Kitchen, the Front Line in the Stunt-Food Wars".</u> The subtitle gets even better: "How did the chain outdo Burger King's Bacon Sundae, Pizza Hut's hot-dog-stuffed crust, Cinnabon's Pizzabon, and KFC's fried-chicken-flavored nail polish?" As a life-long Taco Bell aficionado, I was hooked.

The article, written by Antonia Hitchens, is a deep-dive, long-form piece that aims to shed some light on the massive amounts of time (and millions of dollars!) spent in labs to perfect Taco Bell's Next Big Thing. The piece focuses on the story of the Crunchwrap Supreme. This delicious



creation was repeatedly rejected before becoming the "fastest selling item in Taco Bell history". It's a beautiful thing—the combination of soft and hard shells, the portability, the combination of flavours. It might surprise you to

learn of the years of experimentation that went into its conception and production.

The whole article is worth reading in full, but what I found particularly interesting about it is the way that Taco Bell's success is in large part the result of long, expensive, deliberate experimentation – including failure – that in the end has paid off. That's why for the twelve 'chef scientists' at the research complex outside of Dallas, "failure is a big part of the job."

After reading the article, I started to wonder if maybe something similar could be said about the Christian life. Part of our goal as Christians is to have Christ formed in us, as St. Paul says in Galatians 4:19; this was his prayer for the church in Galatia. Christ is formed in us not by our own efforts, but by finding ways to be open to the grace of God. God is always trying to find a way to get to us, and we get to cooperate with him by opening the door. And this is where we might need to experiment, even fail, as we sustain opportunities for God to make himself present in our lives.


We are not chasing after novelty like the scientists of Taco Bell, but we are about making space for the Holy Spirit in our lives. The meat- and-potatoes of discipleship comes from the usual prayers, worship, study, and evangelism we've learned since we were children. But God has a way of surprising us with his presence in situations that we might not expect. We just need to open the door to them.

In my own life, for instance, a couple of practices have opened me to the grace of God in ways I did not expect.

The first of these has been reconnecting with old friends. I have made it a discipline to reach out to folks I was friends with in childhood. One friendship in particular has been a really healing experience. Most of our conversation is pretty silly, but that's been joy of it. I am grateful for the ways that God has used this connection to lighten both of our hearts through difficult times.

The other practice that has been a surprising opening for God's grace has been running. I started to run because I had to in order to get a passing grade in my high school gym class. But I found pretty quickly that the rhythm and solitude of an evening run through the neighborhood was an opening for the love and grace of God. I don't understand the science of it, but I know that running allows me to be more grateful and almost without fail I come back with a new insight into what God has been doing in my life. I could write of other experiences too: Swimming in wild places or reading poetry, for instance.

As the school year is winding down and vacations are creeping closer, maybe this might be a time for some holy experimentation for you. Continue in the Apostle's teaching and the prayers and the breaking of bread, but be open to other ways that God might speak to you. Perhaps it will be experiencing the beauty of God in poetry or being refreshed by a walk in nature. Maybe it will be making a connection with someone who you haven't seen in a while, or someone who shares nothing in common with you. God has a way of meeting us in the most unexpected places. We just need to be willing to open the door.




