Several years ago, the appendix of Laura, a 14 year-old girl from the west coast, burst while she and her family vacationed on a cruise ship off the Baja Coast. The ship was hundreds of miles from help, and the crew sent out a distress call looking for the nearest surgical unit.

The USS Ronald Reagan was almost 500 miles away—and they answered the call. The carrier was in the midst of training exercises—but the crew of 6000 stopped, turned its ship around and steamed through the night to get within helicopter transport range.

Laura was airlifted on board where navy doctors performed the life-saving surgery.

The cost, from an article by Lisa Mikitarian, 2.5 million dollars per day. How's could Laura's family pay for that? They could not. The cost is way too high.

But the US government believed this little girl was worth saving, so they deployed a naval carrier 500 miles to save her.

Every Sunday, we remember the demonstrable love of God. God's love makes even the intervention of the US Navy seem a small thing. God made us. The Lord came to earth for us. He taught us how to live. Then died and rose from death for us. This Sunday and every day, rejoice in the amazing love of God for YOU!

For most of my life, summer has been the season during which I spend most of my time outdoors. It's really the only time in Canada when one can comfortably sip coffee on patios, swim in lakes and rivers, or lounge in the backyard. Summer has been when our family does most of our impromptu hiking, pool-going, and trips to get ice cream in the evening. To me summers are associated with blue skies, sunlight filtering through green maple leaves, the sharp salty smell of the sea in the morning, and the rising smoke of bonfires at night.

I expect – from what I'm told – that my experience of summer will be a little bit different in East Texas. It can be a challenge to squeeze in time for reading that is 'fun': novels, poetry, even a comic book or two. I am trying to be better at this during the year, but over the summer it's a little easier.

To that end, here is what I have on my summer reading list. Some are books that I've started in the spring but have been pushed to the corner of my desk, and now lay at the bottom of a pile of papers and other more pressing work. Others are books I've had my eye on for a while, but haven't had a chance to read. In many ways, this list is aspirational, so we'll see how far I get. Perhaps some of these books are well-loved favourites of yours, or maybe you've never heard of any of them. My hope is that something on this list will be of interest to you and provide you with some pleasurable hours on a summer afternoon:



Things Fall Apart, Chinua Achebe

This was a book I picked up because it was highlighted when I was browsing Half-Price Books. It's a story of precolonial life in Nigeria, with all of the commonplace tragedy and joy that was present then. I'm about midway through and looking forward to finishing it.



Faith, Hope and Poetry, Malcom Guite

This is on the booklist for a course I am taking in June. Malcom Guite is one of the few academics who is a pleasure to read, and I am looking forward to thinking with him through this volume on the theology of some the great English poets.




What Are We Doing Here?, Marilyn Robinson

The Eyes of the Heart, Frederick Buechner

Essays in Divinity, John Donne

C. S. Lewis writes about the importance of reading old books, so that we are never stuck only in the sins of our own time, but have an outside perspective with different fault from ours. To that end, I am planning to tackle this volume of essays by the great poet and priest.



Purity, Jonathan Franzen

I loved Franzen's newest book *Crossroads* when I read it in the fall. I picked up an earlier novel *Purity* for a few dollars. It's a big book, and who knows if I will get to it this summer or not. But Franzen is wonderful for his believable character portraits and depictions of family life.

I try to incorporate a little bit of poetry into my day as often as possible. To that end, I am slowly working through the complete poems of John Keats. I am also planning to pick up another volume of poetry by Louise Glück, one of my favourite living poets. I try to read one volume by her every year. Deeply meditative and spiritual reflections on the natural world.

I have a few other volumes I started this spring that I want to return to. I planned to re-read my doctoral supervisor, Ephraim Radner's, book *A Time To Keep: Theology, Mortality, and the Shape of Human Life.* This had a great impression on me when I read it several years ago, and I want to recapture some of what I learned and have forgotten. William Dyrness's *Poetic Theology* is also something I want to tackle before the end of June.



Praise for the Past Faith for the Future

As we mentioned in the last Crucifer, our tradition began in 1867 by a handful of visionaries. In 1872, the Hungarian Count and refugee, The Rev. Emir Bela Gyeita Carois Hamvasy became the first rector of Christ Church, Tyler. Two years later our church was welcomed into the Diocese of Texas as a parish. That same year, after great personal sacrifice

by the congregation, the first building at the corner of Locust and Bois d'Arc was completed. That building served Christ Church for over 44 years.





In 1913, two lots were purchased at our current location. Due to wartime and scarce labor, the facility wasn't completed until 1918. The Rev C.E. Snowden led the way in the building project, spending a great deal of time at the construction site. Meanwhile, artists with the House of Jacoby in St. Louis, Missouri created the memorial stained glass windows that are still the adorning hallmark of the downtown worship space.

The floor plan of the original building included the present worship space, the kitchen and dining room under the nave, and the Guild Hall and Sunday School rooms beneath the Guild Hall. These classrooms are currently our early childhood classrooms.

We will soon be telling you more of what our vestry and clergy envision for Christ Church Downtown and Christ Church South. It is our prayer that we can each be a part of a story that impacts our community for many more generations.

Hallelujah! Thanks be to God!


