## The Rev. Dr. Cole Hartin,

One of the practices I've developed over the past several months is a lunch-time jog around the Christ Church neighbour-hood¹ on Fridays. When I started this practice in the late winter, I would leave my warm office, don my underlayer, and run in the damp cold until my body warmed up enough to make life tolerable. On really cold days, I would barely break a sweat. By the time I would return, I would be glad to get inside to warm up.

Now in the summer heat, I leave the chill of my office to sweat it out in the baking sun. I now run with a water belt too, to make sure I stay hydrated. When I return to the office after running several kilometres<sup>2</sup>, I am grateful for the cool, airconditioned building.

Running in both winter and summer has been a great way to get a feel for the city of Tyler, but it's also served as a kind of living parable of what the Church does for us as Christians.

Before and after running, I take shelter in the church building – it is the place of comfort, whether that means warmth and light in the winter; or cool and shade in summer. It's where I leave and return to when I set out in the pleasing but challenging work of running. No matter the season, it is the place of refuge, providing what I need.

Is this not the way the Church functions in our spiritual lives?

Each week we gather in a building with a community of people we call the Church. Here we find shelter in the midst of a world that at times can feel chaotic. Sometimes this world is bitter cold, leaving us isolated and alone. And other times the world is red-hot with violence and anger, leaving us frustrated and fearful.

When we come to the Church, we find relief. We are warmed by the words of Holy Scripture, and our hearts are softened by the beauty of choral music, or the wonderful folk songs we sing at Christ Church South. We find strength in the prayers of our siblings in Christ as they lift up the needs of our hearts and give thanks for the faithfulness of God. We find shelter from the sultry days or bitter nights in the wounds of Jesus. We are nourished and filled by him as we receive his body and blood. At the end of the liturgy, we "go forth in peace to love and serve the Lord", back into the world for another week of holy work.

Now, I am not saying that we can exhaust the meaning of "the Church" by referring to a building, the people who gather in it, or the service of worship we participate in each week. The Church is certainly so much more than these. It's the mystical body of Christ. But it is not less than this building, these people, this gathering. And part of God's purpose for this building, these people, this gathering is to bolster us for the sojourn of each week as we live out the vocations that God has for us. This is one of the rhythms of the Kingdom of God, one of the ways the Spirit supports us as we follow Jesus.

Thanks be to God for the Church!

My parents moved to Texas from Pennsylvania right after they got married. Everyone else stayed in Pennsylvania. I saw my grandmother on my Dad's side twice before she died two years ago and that is the case with most of my extended family.

However, I was not lonely. The church I grew up in was a very small, constantly struggling storefront church that relied mostly on supply priests. We had a few full-time rectors but they never lasted more that a year or two. While this made it difficult to grow our attendance numbers it did grow the strength of our community. Being the small church we were, everyone knew everyone else's business but no one felt the need to pretend that things were okay when they weren't. What a blessing!

The wonderful people of that church became surrogate family to me. One member taught me how to sew. One member who owned a

consignment store would put dresses aside for the girls during prom season. Our grumpy Sr. Warden taught me all the ins and outs of a church service and when I started driving he sold my parents an old car of his for close to nothing. One member taught Sunday school every week and planned it all himself even though there was usually only two of us in class. There was a member that sold Mary Kay who did my make up on my wedding day and several others that helped with set up. One member made me a beautiful quilt (see picture to the right). I didn't even know her that well but that didn't matter to her because I was a part of her community and therefore an extension of her family.

Oue to physical distance my family had a lot of holes but I had a village and God sent me someone that was a perfect fit for every empty space. I felt seen, I felt supported, and I felt loved. Again, what a blessing.

What I learned from this is that I may have no idea how much of an effect some simple time and attention might have on someone. What empty spaces I might be filling, unaware that they even exist.


