This blessing is engraved outside the great doors of Canterbury Cathedral, and on an exterior wall of Westminster Abbey in London.

Used by Anglican Christians since at least the reign of Elizabeth I, we have used it on occasion as a blessing at the conclusion of worship services at Christ Church.

At our congregation and throughout the world, the Feast of All Saints is a special day.

Our culture remembers this day by dressing in costume and trick or treating. But for many centuries, the Church has gathered together on All Saints to remember the faithful departed.

The venerable blessing inscribed on the walls of the greatest Anglican cathedrals in the world captures the heart of our hopes on All Saints – that God would bless us all – the living and the dead. By remembering the faithful departed, we are reminded of the gift of life, and are inspired to pursue a better world in their memory, as ambassadors of the Lord Jesus.

We will observe the Feast of All Saints on Sunday November 5. We will recall the lives and ministry of the faithful departed. We will baptize new believers in the Christian faith. And in the nave at 6:00 that Sunday evening, we will worship the Lord through the beautiful music of Choral Evensong.

As the weather begins to turn, as the leaves fall away, and as the sunshine wanes, may God grant you and yours grace, peace, and eternal life.

Swedish Death Cleaning

Last week I got a notice from the City of Tyler that this week would be Bulky Item Cleanup Week. I didn't think very much about it until yesterday, when I saw a pile of unwanted, bulky items in front of my neighbor's house. Immediately, I remembered a large, metal dog gate that was broken and beyond repair (Great Pyrenees have very little regard for dog gates). As I placed the broken gate in front of my house, I thought about several pieces of lawn furniture that should accompany the dog gate to the dump. I didn't place any of the lawn furniture for collection because of the thought that I can repair it, or my children or grandchildren might want it, or we might need the lawn furniture in the future. Then reality hit. I don't, have the time, the skill, or the will to repair that furniture, and my children and grandchildren certainly don't want a bunch of broken-down lawn furniture. And realistically at my age, in my next abode whether it is in this life or the next, I won't be needing lawn furniture.

All of this made me think back to an article I read in *The Wall Street Journal* several weeks ago about a process called Swedish Death Cleaning, The article spoke of a TV series based on a book titled *The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning* by Margareta Magnusson. The subtitle of the book is *How to Free Yourself and Your Family from a Lifetime of Clutter*. Magnusson says, "I am death cleaning, or, as we call it in Swedish, *döstädning*. *Dö* is "death" and städning is "cleaning." In Swedish it is a term that means that you remove unnecessary things and make your home nice and orderly when you think the time is

coming closer for you to leave the planet...So what is death cleaning? For me it means going through all my belongings and deciding how to get rid of the things I do not want anymore. Just look around you. Several of your things have probably been there for so long that you do not even see or value them anymore."

For me, a good beginning would be with the things that I have kept but haven't looked at in years. Things in the attic and in the storage unit that I have had for years. And books, books, and more books. Death cleaning is done in consideration of our loved ones. "Do not ever imagine that anyone will wish—or be able—to schedule time off to take care of what you didn't bother to take care of yourself. No matter how much they love you, don't leave this burden to them." Death cleaning sounds morbid, but if you think about it is really not. Composer Leonard Cohen once said, "Putting your house in order, if you can do it, is one of the most comforting activities, and the benefits of it are incalculable."

Even more important as we look toward the future is a spiritual house cleaning. How about putting our spiritual house in order. How about getting rid of things that are of no use to us. How about getting rid of the guilt and shame because of past sins? How about getting rid of old grudges and broken relationships? How about focusing on the one thing that we most want to keep and find most dear – our relationship with Jesus Christ?



What is a Pledge?

A pledge is an **estimate of giving**; some call it a **statement of intent**. Your pledge amount may be changed, increased or decreased during the year, at any time as your financial circumstances change.

Why should I Pledge?

Pledging allows you to **make intentional decisions** about your financial giving. When you plan for your giving, you make conscious choices about spending your money in ways **that reflect your faith & values**. Receiving your pledge allows the Vestry, the church's governing board, to do for our parish community what you do for your household: plan wisely for the use of our resources in support of the mission and ministry to which God has called us.

The Vestry sets a budget based on the total amount pledged to the church. While plate offerings are important to the parish, your pledge lets the Vestry plan more accurately for the ministry we can accomplish.

Identity is a central theme during adolescence and a very important one. Self-identity is the basis of self-esteem. Do our teens realize they were made on purpose for His purpose and that they are fully capable of bringing God's love into this world?

When that true identity is realized it cannot be shaken by fumbling a pass or failing a test. It cannot be swayed by tiktok videos or mean-spirited kids. They will have the knowledge that they belong, whatever the circumstances might be. We just have to keep reminding them.






