#### FROM THE RECTOR:

Now there were in the church at Antioch prophets and teachers... While they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, "Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them." Then after fasting and praying they laid their hands on them and sent them off. Acts 13:1,3

The Book of Acts describes the role that fasting played in the community's effort to discern God's will. Following ancient Jewish practice described and proscribed in Leviticus 23:27, Zechariah 8:19, Joel 2:15, 2 Chronicles 20:1-4, Ezra 8:21-23, and throughout Scripture, the Church fasted from food in an attempt to draw nearer to the Lord. They understood that fasting which was God-centered, God-initiated, and Godordained might be used by God to help them know and follow the Lord more faithfully.

For many centuries, the church has continued to fast in an effort to seek after the Lord.

Indeed, in 1756, facing a French invasion, the King of Britain called for a solemn day of prayer and fasting. Commenting on its effect, on February 6, John Wesley wrote in his journal, "The fast day was a glorious day. Humility has turned into national rejoicing, for the threatened invasion by the French has been averted."

Lent is a season in which the Lord invites us to draw nearer to Him. From the birth of the church, we have embraced the discipline of fasting to nurture our relationship with Christ.



I invite you to commit to a solemn fast this Lent. Do not subject yourself to harm, but abstain from something you enjoy for the sake of Christ, in the hopes that "after you have suffered a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, confirm, strengthen, and establish you" (1 Peter 5:10).

May the Lord bless you with a Holy Lent.

One of the practices that I've tried to incorporate into my life (more or less successfully) has been the practice of reading poetry.

The first books of poems I ever purchased were on a trip during spring break when I was in college. I was in my sophomore year, Amy and I were just married, and, along with a few friends, we took a trip down from Abbotsford, British Columbia, to camp at Cape Lookout State Park on the Oregon coast. Along the way, we spent a day in Portland, where we visited Powell's Books, one of the world's largest independent bookstores.

We spent an hour or two sipping coffee from Stumptown (a favourite roastery) while browsing the stacks in the cavernous bookstore. There was a whole wall of poetry, and I ran my hand across the spines of books, shelf after shelf, looking for names I recognized and (more importantly) books I could afford.

Since we were married so young and were keeping afloat on part-time jobs and student loans, I didn't have much to spend. But I found a couple of deals I couldn't refuse. A clearance copy of Robert Frost, whose quality was so poor that some of the pages were left blank, and a thicker, but well-loved collection of poems by Emily Dickinson. I bought these two volumes for a song, and smuggled them across the border back into Canada, where they were added to the meagre collection of books we kept on the Ikea shelf in our mouldy one bedroom apartment.

I started to leaf through these poems after reading the Bible each morning, coffee cup in hand.

Reading poetry, I discovered, was far more difficult than reading prose. I could easily skim a textbook or bound from page to page in the novels I was reading, but poetry was more demanding. It forced me to slow down and savor the language, to stop at the end of a line and ask myself if I really knew what was going on, to open my mind

to the possibility that some ambiguity in the text was meant to be intriguing, rather than an excuse to flip to the next page. To learn to read poetry was, for me, an attempt to learn to listen, to attend.

I'm still trying to learn to listen to poems. And I have found that listening to poems has helped me be a little bit better at listening to people as well. My hope is that listening to poems helps me better listen to God.

We live in a world where everything is frantic. We are inundated with information constantly, and our lives are oh-so-full. We also live in a world where we are increasingly lonely, in which we feel nobody is listening to us, and many people have nobody to listen to them. I want to be the kind of person who listens, the kind of person who holds space for people, the way I believe Jesus holds space for all of us. Poetry has been one way for me to learn to do this better.

More recently, in the past several years, I have even started writing poetry, which is its own kind of listening. My first collection of poems, What Has Been Left Behind, came out recently. You can find it on amazon or at the Christ Church gift shop.



How Are You?

I believe that in our culture the phrase "how are you" is akin to saying "hello". It's used more as a greeting than as a genuine query into someone's wellbeing. To be honest, though, I don't know why this is. Is it an absent-minded but benign question or could it be our desire to appear empathetic or truly interested in

someone's current state of being? I wonder how we would react if someone authentically and vulnerably told us how they really were?

We unconsciously make assumptions based on demeanor or body language but in the end, all we can really know about someone is what they choose to share with us. Anything else is just speculation.

Kids choose to have their faces painted in a way that best symbolizes their personalities and interests. And while this is an outward and visible sign, it tells us little about what is going on in their hearts and minds.

While not a sacrament, the imposition of ashes does show an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace. Our practice is literally "worn" on our faces, leaving no question as to our religious affiliation. But "how are we" spiritually?

On Ash Wednesday, Fr. Cole reminded us that Lent is a good time to do a little "housekeeping" for the soul. It's one thing to walk around all day with a black cross of ash on our foreheads but it's another thing entirely to wrestle with what the season of Lent is calling us to do. My hope is that this Lent our younger learners will be able to digest the wonderful stories of Jesus's miracles, passion and resurrection using the manipulatives of Godly Play, and our older learners will develop a deeper connection to what the eucharist really means in our lives.


