
FROM THE RECTOR:

Birthed in the wake of the Civil War, Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. Launched on May 5, 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, people today associate Memorial Day with picnics, bar-b-que, and a three-day holiday. But it serves as an annual reminder that the lives we enjoy in this great country were won through the sacrifice of others.

Likewise, the Church has just crossed into the season after Pentecost. This past Sunday, we celebrated the pouring out of the Holy Spirit on the early Christian fellowship in Jerusalem. We remembered the gifts which accompanied the anointing of the Holy Spirit – tongues, prophecy, healing, and more. And we were reminded of our own family history.

Like Memorial Day, Pentecost serves as an annual reminder that the life we share in Christ exists because of the hard work and sacrifice of others. My forefathers and mothers were not present in Jerusalem in the First Century. Two thousand years ago, my ancestors lived in what is now Germany and the British Isles. They were a pagan people. They worshipped inanimate objects and participated in all manner of heathen religious rituals.

Yet centuries ago, empowered by the Holy Spirit's anointing on that memorable Pentecost, and in response to the charge from Jesus to 'Go and make disciples of all the nations,' Christian missionaries traveled many months over treacherous ground in hostile lands to share the Good News of Christ with my ancestors.



This Memorial Day, in addition to the fun, offer prayers of earnest thanks for the men and women whose sacrifices have secured our liberty. And as we begin the season after Pentecost, honor the sacrifices of those who introduced your ancestors to Christ by praying for your unchurched neighbors and by inviting a friend to join you on Sunday in church.

We do not have to load the cannon. We do not have to face the heathens in pagan Britain and Germania or elsewhere. But we can honor the memory and service of those who did through our own prayers and service unto others.

May the Lord bless you with a joyful Memorial Day!

God Bless Our Children: As many of you know, Ann and I have been serving in Florida for the past six months. We returned on May 1, and I was blessed to be at Christ Church for Youth Sunday. Congratulations to Jack, Oliver, Elizabeth, Brighton, Miles, and Marigny our graduating seniors who were honored last Sunday. I was at the downtown campus and heard a powerful sermon by Elizabeth Huggler, and a great job of reading by Marigny Teagarden, including accurate pronunciation of some difficult biblical words. Youth Sunday has caused me to reflect on our children and the challenges they will face.

College has always presented a challenge for a young adult's faith. First of all, the simple fact of being on one's own for the first time can be challenging - deciding what to eat, what to wear, how to manage money, choosing friends, when to study, when to go to class. Freshman year can be an opportunity to make some very bad choices, choices that can have far-reaching consequences. Additionally, at many colleges and universities students are encouraged to "think for themselves," but think with a worldview that runs counter to Christianity and traditional American values.

Particularly alarming, especially for the parents of children in college, are the anti-Israel protests found on many campuses since October 7. Students encouraged by professional activists and even some faculty members have seriously disrupted campus life at a number of schools engaging in some cases in criminal activity and outrageous anti-Semitism. Graduation celebrations were disrupted all across the country. The protest that really caught my eye was at, of all places, Duke University, a Methodist University.

A number of students at Duke walked out of commencement in protest of graduation and honorary degree recipient Jerry Seinfeld. Jerry Seinfeld! Seinfeld is a comedian whose daughter is a Duke graduate and whose son is a student there. Seinfeld is Jewish and a supporter of Israel. I watched Seinfeld's speech. The speech was entirely apolitical, funny, and insightful.

One young woman ripped up her diploma as she walked across the stage. Fortunately, there was a large number of graduates who chanted, "Jerry, Jerry," The point that I want to make here is that to stay faithful to Jesus and to follow him requires a firm foundation. From the old hymn: How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord...Fear not, I am with thee, oh, be not dismayed, For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid; I'll strengthen thee, help thee, and cause thee to stand, Upheld by My gracious, omnipotent hand.

That firm foundation begins in the home, a loving Christian home, a home where being in church on Sunday is the norm. In our culture today, that can be difficult. Youth sports are now often scheduled on Sunday. I love the quiz show, Jeopardy. Last week one of the questions was, "For what was runner Eric Liddell best known?" The answer is that Liddell was favored in the 1924 Olympics in Paris in the 100-meter race, but he refused to compete because the race was to be held on a Sunday. I remember a priest saying that there are only two excuses for not being in church on Sunday – illness and travel. Families need to be in church on Sunday; children need to be in church on Sunday.

Youth & Children's ministry is a key element in building a firm foundation in our children. Christ Church takes this ministry seriously. Under Fr. David's leadership we have an excellent team of youth & children's ministry leaders, and thanks to many of you, we have \$3 million worth of improved facilities. I got a tour of the classrooms and children's chapel at the South Campus last week, and it is spectacular. Work on the new and improved chapel downtown is a work in progress. Our new facilities are a true blessing, and I pray that we will fill them with children. God bless our graduates. God bless our children.


It has been an honor getting to know these seniors. I am grateful for the year I had with them but also wish I could have one more.






