Naturals disasters have always been with us.

This morning, a substantial earthquake off the western coast of Russia created a tsunami which affected coastal areas from Japan to California.

On July 4th weekend, very heavy rains in the Hill Country resulted in massive flooding on the Guadalupe River which took the lives of over 138 people, including 27 girls and counselors at Camp Mystic. And on July 13, a wildfire sparked by lightning strikes destroyed the Grand Canyon Lodge at the north rim of the Grand Canyon. Our family had reservations at the GC Lodge beginning July 17.

From earthquakes to heavy rain, from hurricanes to forest fire, devastating weather has always been a constant challenge and threat to people.

David reminds us in Psalm 46 that 'though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea', the Lord is with us. God is with us



in the midst of the storms of life, strengthening us, providing for us, and comforting us.

We understand that living on the Gulf Coast, in a flood plain, or along a fault line involves a heightened vulnerability to natural disasters. But there is always danger in the world. Colossians 2.6 teaches, 'Therefore, as you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.'

As we walk through a world riddled with uncertainty and surprise, Jesus Christ is our foundation. Trust in Him. Walk in Him. Root your life in Christ. And give thanks for God's blessings.

"Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, 35 like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. 36 Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place and to stand before the Son of Man." – Luke 21:34-36

I recently came across this passage of Scripture during my devotional time. My practice is to follow the order for morning prayer in the *Book of Common Prayer*, usually reading the Old Testament lesson alongside of the Gospel lesson. It came up sometime in the past week or so.

I've read this passage probably hundreds of times throughout my life but something interesting struck me for the first time while I was reading it recently.

This passage is from near the end of Jesus's ministry in Luke's Gospel. Jesus is warning his disciples about his second coming, when he will return to judge the living and the dead. He tells them—and us—to "be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down." This part was familiar to me, the sense that we need to be vigilant and alert in prayer as we wait for our Lord.

But the why is what struck me. Jesus warns of three dangers, three things that might weigh us down. These are "dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life."

Since I grew up a Pentecostal Church, I quickly learned about the dangers of drunkenness and other vices. Dissipation is probably related to this, in the way it connotes wasteful, overly lavish and indulgent living.

Sometimes Pentecostals get a bad rap for overemphasizing personal holiness and thus the dangers of things like alcohol, tobacco, dancing or card playing.

Sometimes they judge other Christians who enjoy beer of wine in moderation and set themselves up as somehow morally superior. But saying all of this, I think Pentecostals and other Christians in the Holiness tradition are right to warn of the dangers of too much drink and dissipation. Indeed, they are simply reiterating Jesus's warning here, that to give our lives over to these or any pleasure is detrimental to our souls. Immoderate love of worldly goods weighs us down, separates us from God, and keeps us from the wide-eyed wonder with which Jesus calls us to live while we wait for his appearing.

What I did not grow up seeing so clearly, however, and what struck me now, is that along with drunkenness and dissipation, it is "the worries of this life" that have a way of weighing us down. This struck me because I've often thought of worrying—something I admit I am prone to do—as the opposite of drunkenness and dissipation. These latter two are behaviours that numb us and make us to forget. But worry is an intensification, an almost frantic focus on what could go wrong. Instead of numbing us, it keys us up.

And yet Jesus is saying here that the effect is the same. Worrying about life, what we'll eat or drink or wear, what

others will think of us, how well we're saving for retirement, how great a school our kids will go to, these things weigh us down. Worrying is no better for our souls than too much drink.

And part of our call as his disciples is to be prayerful-\ ly vigilant against this worry.

I'm praying that the Holy Spirit strengthens me to be better at this. I no more want to be weighed down with worry than anything else. I want to live with a light heart and an open hand because I trust God to provide for us, and because Jesus promises to be with us always.





### Literally, I, Holly Marsh, have sung at least one verse of every hymn in the Hymnal 1982!

(It was a fundraiser for a choir tour.) So, I have a number of favorite hymns, but when Jeffrey asked me to contribute to this article, three hymns came to my mind immediately.

#### **Hymn 370**, St. Patrick/Deirdre, "I bind unto myself today"

I have sung this many times, but one instance stands out in my memory. In February 1995, Christ Church hosted not only Diocesan Council, but also the Consecration and Installation of Bishop Claude Payne as our Diocesan Bishop. The service was held at Caldwell Auditorium. This was the processional hymn during which the diocesan clergy processed to their seats in the auditorium. It was thrilling to watch the lengthy procession and to hear 1800+ people singing as one voice. I know the hymn is challenging to sing but it's so worth the work. And verse 6 that begins with "Christ be with me, Christ within me" is a prayer unto itself.

#### Hymn 305, Cranham, "In the bleak midwinter"

I must have at least one Christmas hymn on my list! This hymn presents a beautiful scene of the stable on a cold December night, with angels hovering, and Mary holding the baby Jesus. I would imagine there is a painting of this scene hanging in a museum somewhere. It's a lovely scene, but it's the fourth verse that stirs so much emotion for me:

What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would give a lamb, If I were a wise man, I would do my part, Yet what I can, I give him, give my heart.

And isn't that what Jesus wants from all of us?

#### Hymn 24, St. Clement, "The day thou gavest, Lord, is ended"

This is a standard hymn in our services of Evensong. One of first times I remember hearing it was when the St. Mark's Men and Boys Choir came to Christ Church to present Evensong. When the boys of the choir started singing a beautiful descant on the final verse, I could no longer sing because of my tears! It speaks of thanksgiving for the day, prayers for rest, the presence of the Church everywhere, and constant prayer.




